Their Primary school offer has been developed to bring a memorable experience for our children. Quality food is the basis of their offer coupled with innovation that delivers fantastic dining experiences that will ensure our pupils truly enjoy their lunches and go back to lessons nourished, relaxed and ready to learn. The menus are nutritionally balanced and compliant with the revised food standards and allergen labelling regulations, special dietary needs are also considered and catered for. This will offer our children hot lunches that they are familiar with and therefore more likely to eat. The new menus will be circulated as soon as they are available. Meal ordering and payments will move to a new App. Details of this will be shared after half-term.

Are you missing benefits that are available to you?

You can get £100 and free school dinners for your children!

If you are eligible and sign up, you will be able to access both. "My child already gets free dinners in KS1," you might say, but they won't in KS2 unless you sign up for this. Once 'signed up' you will have access to a one off fund of £100 to use during the time that your child is at St Chad's. This £100 can be used for a range of things school based, including

- Trips during school time or after school where a donation is asked for by the school,
- School camp,
- Payment of after / before school clubs,
- Any activity in school where a donation is asked for, such as a visitor to the classroom,
- School uniform to be purchased from Monkhouse/Linela where we have negotiated a payment procedure and where you are able to purchase logoed items.

If you want more information, please go to https://www.gov.uk/apply-free-school-meals. It is an anonymous application; it does not come to the school but to the local authority and once accepted, the benefits are yours. The purpose of the fund is to support academic development, hence the list, and school -of course- will not hold cash on site, so rather a running tally of spends will be kept. We hope that this will both help the school further provide great education and also support eligible families with the ongoing demands of having a child in school.

Uniform reminder

A reminder that the list below is a basic uniform list that the children are required to wear to school. We do not require a logo on items but if you wish to purchase these, you can do so from Linela or Monkhouse (see our website for further details).

- White or light blue shirts/polo shirts.
- Navy sweatshirts or cardigan.
- Grey or black trousers/skirt/pinafore.
- Summer option plain black/grey shorts, blue/white check or stripe summer dresses.
- Plain, black sensible shoes. We do not allow high heels or raised shoes for safety reasons.

Suitable clothing for P.E is essential and we are asking for the following to be worn: Completely plain white t-shirt or completely plain t-shirt in your child's house colour (the school logo is allowed), appropriate sports' trainers that can be used within PE lessons (ideally black), plain, black or navy sweatshirt/zip-up top, black or navy shorts, jogging bottoms or leggings.

<u>Items, such as football shirts, are not part of our PE uniform and we kindly request that children wear the appropriate items to school for PE days. Please make sure that PE hoodies/jumpers are plain black or navy.</u>

Primary school admissions

If your child was born between 1 September 2021 and 31 August 2022, you must apply for them to start primary school in September 2026. This is a very important decision and it is important that you read the South Gloucestershire Primary school admission guide before you apply. Applications for primary school admission must be submitted no later than 15 January 2026.

Attendance

- Consistently very good attendance helps children to access the full curriculum and receive the support and challenge needed to move their learning on. In line with our attendance policy, we do not authorise holidays in term time, so please try to book holiday during the 13 weeks of school holidays. % attendance will be monitored on a termly basis:
- 96%+ is expected and very good
- 95-95.9% is close to expectation
- 90-94.9% is cause for concern
- 89.9% or less is classed as a persistent absentee.

Where attendance is becoming a concern, parents may be invited to a School Attendance Meeting (with targets set for improvement) and fines may be incurred in the case of persistent absentees or prolonged unauthorised holidays. Our S. Glos Education Welfare Officer supports us with attendance matters.

Please also support your child to arrive in school on time as this also affects learning and attendance percentages.

In line with our safeguarding responsibilities, the school office will always ring parents of children who are absent from school and where we have not been notified or updated on a daily basis.

Successful visits from external professionals this term:

We have had a number of external visits to our wonderful school this term, including a Local Authority Safeguarding inspection, a Local Authority Education review and a visit from our Bridge Strategic lead (also an Ofsted inspector). We have been really pleased with the feedback received. Here are some of the comments below directly from the professionals.

Strengths

- **Safeguarding systems are secure.** Evidence from all staff that safeguarding culture is the highest priority.
- There is a **strong caring ethos** shown in the consistency of purpose which was detectable across the whole school.
- Staff are secure in school processes in reporting concerns. They feel very well supported by the Head and evidence of training was reported.
- The children spoke with a love for school. They feel safe, know who they would go to if they had a worry and are confident that they would be helped.
- Strong evidence of analytical thinking and linking to strategic planning on show.
- Strong leadership with a clear focus for continued development and understanding of where the organisation needs to progress.
- Strong safeguarding Governor practice
- Annual Face to face training with an external speaker was highly valued by staff at all levels.
- The Headteacher was exceptionally well prepared with extensive notes and evidence pre-prepared for the visit.
- The school has invested in research, CPD and targeted support for teachers to secure an effective consistent lesson design built around the principles of Rosenshine. This lesson design incorporates small step teaching but, central to the organisation of learning, is how and when teachers check understanding. During the learning walks it was clear that teachers have a clear understanding of this design and actively seek out opportunities to check understanding and tackle misconceptions in the moment. The level of consistency around lesson design is high. Teachers, through delivery and planning, demonstrate confidence and accuracy. The impact of this investment can be seen in how well children thrive in lessons. The skill of the Teaching Assistants to enhance the role of the class teacher remains secure. Leaders and teachers prioritise the training of Teaching Assistants and help them to more effectively support children and groups.
- The purposeful and deliberate scaffolding and coding of lessons so that all children can access the learning is outstanding. During the evaluation, visual coding using Widgit and other icons was prolific. All teachers coded their learning. Scaffolds were universal to reduce stigma and, at its best, teachers had deliberately ensured that the coding used in their teaching was replicated on desks and on the learning walls. Children spoke confidently about the scaffolds and used the adaptations well. The consistency of the scaffolding continued into small group interventions and 1:1 support. Further to the visual scaffolding, the school team understand the importance of verbal scaffolds. Teachers invest in robust instruction of vocabulary.
- Children at St Chad's thrive. Time and time again, external visit reports comment on the 'excellent' provision and quality of education. This is down to secure leadership. The Senior Leadership Team is experienced, research informed, diligent and rooted in assessing success or challenges rather than assuming. These Leaders are reflective practitioners and understand the importance of being outward facing. Most significantly, they understand what high-quality inclusive teaching needs to look like.

Our next steps as a school are to consider the development of handwriting and spelling across the school.
